Subject: Waiving of Fees - Rainbow Club Australia Inc- Ocean Swim

Introduction

A letter has been received from Mr Rob Lloyd, Mr Murray Rose AO and Ms Amanda Donohoe of Rainbow Club Australia Inc seeking Council's assistance in the waiving of fees for the staging of an ocean swim from Malabar Beach to Little Bay Beach on 21 February 2010.

Issues

This event is a 2.7 km ocean swim from Malabar Beach to Little Bay Beach and all funds raised from the participants and minor sponsors will benefit Rainbow Club Australia Inc.

The applicants have advised:

"The Rainbow Club has secured sufficient financial backing to ensure the swim will become an annual event and we hope an integral part of the culture of the ocean swim community and the communities of Malabar and Little Bay".

In order to streamline the event for future years, the Rainbow Club of Australia has requested Council approval and the waiving of all associated fees for the next five (5) years from 2010–2015.

It is considered that this event is very worthwhile and listed below are the associated fees for 2010:



Subject: Sydney Airport Community Forum - Council involvement

Introduction

The Sydney Airport Community Forum (SACF) was established by the Federal Government in July 1996 as a consultation body on the Sydney Airport Long-Term Operating Plan (LTOP) and noise impacts from the Airport. The Forum includes representatives from the community, local councils, State and Federal Parliament, and industry. The Mayors of Randwick City participated until early 2001 when this Council and other members withdrew due to concerns with the utility of the Forum.

I consider that it is now a suitable time for the Council to again contribute to this Forum and its discussions on Sydney Airport, noise impacts and Sydney air travel in general.

Issues

The SACF is the main body for consultation on the Sydney Airport LTOP. Its role is to provide advice to the Minister for infrastructure, Regional Development and Local Government, Sydney Airport Corporation (SAC) and aviation authorities on aircraft noise and related environmental issues, as well as advice on the LTOP and ways to improve consultation and information to the community.

In 2000, based on the motion of the Mr Albanese, Federal Member for Grayndler, various SACF members including Randwick City Council submitted their withdrawal given concerns that the SACF had failed in its role of providing advice to the Minister and authorities on aircraft noise abatement and related environmental problems at Sydney Airport.

Our Council has continued to monitor and been actively involved in any airport issues likely to affect our residents, such as preparing detailed submissions on development and master plans and ANEF changes for the airport, and actions such as the 2005 inner city council organised rally against inappropriate airport development proposals.

In 2007, the SACF membership was reconstituted following the change in Federal Government. Given that there now appears to be renewed commitment to working with local councils and the community on key airport issues, and given also continuing pressures for growth in Sydney and its resulting airport traffic, and further the value of ensuring that Randwick's resident interests are represented directly in this Forum, I am now proposing that Council again seek membership and input into the Forum.

Recommendation

That Council agree to write to the Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government seeking that the Mayor of Randwick City Council (or a representative) be reinstated as a member of the Sydney Airport Community Forum (SACF).

Subject: Lexington Place Youth Program in Partnership with South Sydney Rugby League Club

Introduction

One of the outcomes agreed upon at the recent Councillors' Workshop was that more needs to be done to assist the disadvantaged youth in the Lexington Place area. One idea discussed was to partner with the South Sydney Football Club to foster a number of initiatives which the local youth would identify with and would promote improved health and fitness.

Issues

Accordingly, the General Manager and I met with representatives from the South Sydney Football Club to discuss a number of worthwhile initiatives. The meeting was a very fruitful one, with the South Sydney Rabbitohs very keen to assist with the development of disadvantaged youth in this area. We believe the best outcome was reached, with Randwick City Council becoming an official "Rabbitohs Club 17 Partner" under the umbrella of the "Souths Cares Program." This brings with it a number of exciting initiatives which will arouse much interest and excitement with local youth in the Lexington Place area.

The first initiative to be announced is that one of the indigenous South Sydney players will become an ambassador for the local area and it gives me great pleasure to announce that Beau Champion will be that player which the local youth will identify with. Beau Champion is one of the stars of the current South Sydney team and will attend and run training clinics in the local area to encourage local youth to become involved in rugby league and lead a healthier lifestyle.

Another initiative is that a large number of tickets will be made available to every South's home game and will be available for Council to distribute as it sees fit. These tickets could be used as a reward for progress made at school, for volunteer work undertaken in the local area, for group morale building events, as gifts to schools in the area or for any other reason chosen by Council and its youth workers. There are also other initiatives which will be undertaken as the 2010 football season unfolds.

Financial impact statement

It is recommended that Council make a contribution of \$11,000.00 to assist with this very worthwhile program and that the contribution be funded from the 2009-10 Contingency Fund.

Conclusion

Council is committed to helping the disadvantaged youth in the Lexington Place area and putting these kids in touch with their rugby league heroes and getting them to listen to these players is a fantastic initiative which will hopefully show these youth that there are other more positive paths that they can follow in life.

Subject: To provide a briefing for all NSW Councils on the progress of Randwick's Local Govt Emissions Trading Scheme (LGETS) in April 2010

Introduction

To seek endorsement for a briefing of all NSW Councils on the progress of the NSW Local Government Emissions Trading Scheme (LGETS) being developed and implemented by Randwick and 11 other NSW Councils.

Issues

Randwick's current initiative to develop and implement a carbon trading scheme for local government has reached another significant milestone, completion of practice trades between the 12 participating Councils. From the end of 2008, when the emissions register was completed for the 9 metropolitan and 3 regional Councils, there has been a substantial investment in effort and time to deliver on the next major task agreed to, a framework for the trading of carbon 'units' across the group.

Following last years local government elections there are probably many Councillors across NSW unaware of the details of the NSW Local Government Emissions Trading Scheme (LGETS). I would like to propose a briefing opportunity for new and interested Councillors from both participating and potentially new Councils on the elements of our local government carbon trading scheme and help increase their understanding and confidence in responding to questions about carbon trading. This is critically important for local government as we await the outcome of government's around the world and their decision-making in Copenhagen as well as the future timing and detail of the Commonwealth Government's own carbon trading scheme.

Our Councillors may wish to put the date into their own calendar, 22 April 2010, at the Prince Henry Community Centre. I would like to send a letter inviting all Councils in NSW to this briefing.

Relationship to City Plan

The relationship with the City Plan is as follows:

Outcome 10: A healthy environment.

Direction 10(a): Council is a leader in fostering environmental practices

Direction 10(g): To reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Financial impact statement

A budget of up to \$7,000 will be provided for the briefing including accessing a number of specialist speakers and catering. These costs would be paid from the climate change budget under the environmental levy program.

Conclusion

As well as building the confidence of Councillors to better communicate on and understand issues related to carbon trading, this briefing will enable Councils to be properly informed on the NSW Local Government Emissions Trading Scheme and encourage their active participation in LGETS when it is open for new Council entries later in 2010.

Introduction

The Coogee Late Night Transport (Pumpkin Bus) Report (W41/09) was adopted by the Works Committee on 10 November, 2009 (Notley-Smith/Smith). Council has contacted the Local Members for Coogee and Maroubra.

The Mayor sent a letter to each of the identified venue licensees asking if they would support the service for Friday and Saturday night each week throughout the summer.

Issues

The letter explained the issues and gave the licensees a deadline of close of business on Monday 23 November to submit their responses.

The subsequent list details the amount that was requested of each licence and their response to the request as at 4pm, Tuesday, 24 November 2009.

The Eastern Beaches Liquor Accord (EBLA) has already agreed to contribute an additional \$2000 of funding.

The cost of the service for Friday night / Saturday morning is \$822.55 excluding GST, and the cost of the Saturday night / Sunday morning service is \$1069.54 excluding GST.

The weekend total is \$1892.09.

A presentation by Council's, Community Road Safety Officer to the EBLA Annual General Meeting resulted in further discussion about the feasibility and continued appropriateness of the service in addressing the issues in Coogee. Many of the venues were happy to contribute and saw the service as a worthwhile community initiative, but did not agree with the amount of funding that was requested of them.

Albert Gardner, Director, Liquor and Gaming was present at the meeting and explained the process of mandatory contributions to the members. The local members of Coogee and Maroubra have advised Council that they are supportive of the Pumpkin Bus and of Council's initiative in maintaining this service.

Relationship to the City Plan

The relationship to the City Plan is as follows:

Outcome 6: A liveable City

Direction 6c: The safety of our community is paramount and is acknowledged and supported through proactive policies, programmes and strategies.

Financial impact statement

The cost of the service for 26 weeks, two nights a week is \$49,194. Contributions to date total \$11,800. Therefore, Council will need to fund the remaining \$37,394 for the service to continue.

Conclusion

Given the limited response to the Mayor's request for support of this initiative and the outcome of the EBLA meeting, the Council should undertake an application to the Office of Liquor Gaming and Racing to force mandatory contributions through the *Liquor Act 2007*, to continue operations of the Pumpkin late night bus.

Recommendation

THAT Council:

1. make a formal application to the Office of Liquor Gaming and Racing using the *Liquor Act 2007* legislation to recover the cost of Friday and Saturday night operations if venues are not forthcoming with funds.
2. underwrite the continued operation of a 2 night per week Pumpkin Bus service for the 2009 / 2010 summer period

Subject: Supporting "Sense of Community" Street Parties

Introduction

Council has received requests for approval to temporarily close roads for street parties. Street parties can be a positive way of allowing residents and neighbours to interact, reinforcing community values and creating a true "Sense of Community".

Under the Roads and Traffic Authority's guidelines temporary road closures for such street parties are able to be approved by Council directly, provided that the applicants adhere to Council's Schedule of Conditions.

The standard conditions that Council imposes on event organisers are to keep the general public and the participants of the event safe, to direct traffic safely around the event, to inform the emergency services of the event and to reduce the impacts of the event on non event users.

Issues

The usual way to manage traffic for temporary road closures, in order to comply with the relevant OHS act, is to create a Traffic Control Plan (TCP). A TCP describes the layout of traffic control devices such as barriers and signs. The layout should be designed by suitably qualified traffic control designers. However, in some circumstances further transport management measures are required. For example, Council has recently received a request from residents of Aboud Avenue, Kingsford, to temporarily close the road for a street party. As Aboud Avenue, is within 100m of a state road, the RTA requires a Road Occupancy License (ROL) and a Transport Management Plan (TMP). A TMP is a report on how Traffic and Transport will be managed, the likely traffic impacts of the event on the regional or state road network and its impacts on the public transport and emergency services.

Organising traffic control can be a complex process and many resident organisers require assistance to correctly design and implement appropriate traffic control. Council's Integrated Transport Department can assist residents in preparing simple traffic control plans for the events.

To further assist residents of Randwick, and to improve opportunities for residents to build a sense of community, it is proposed that traffic control measures required for neighbourhood street parties be arranged by Council, on behalf of the event organiser.

Enquiries made of Council's insurers confirm that approved street party event organisers are covered for any public liability claim arising from any incident which occurs upon the street.

Financial impact statement

Depending on the dates and times of the proposed street party the traffic control would be undertaken by Council staff or by external contractors (arranged by Council). The costs for traffic control would be, on average, \$1,500.00. At this stage

Council has received 3 applications for such street parties. The subject streets are Aboud Avenue, Kingsford; Hooper Street, Randwick and Park Avenue, Randwick. Therefore Council may wish to vote \$4,500 to cover the costs associated with these three events with funds being allocated from the 2009/10 Council Contingency Fund. Also, if additional applications are received prior to New Year's Eve it is suggested that a similar approach be taken.

Conclusion

As part of Council's commitment to building "a sense of community", support should be given towards neighbourhood street parties. To safely close the road to facilitate street parties, appropriate traffic control should be implemented. To assist residents and encourage them to hold neighbourhood street parties, it is proposed that Council arrange, on behalf of the residents, all traffic control measures associated with street parties.

Recommendation

THAT Council:

1. support "Sense of Community" street parties by arranging, on behalf of residents:
 - a. traffic control plans
 - b. the preparation of traffic management plans and road occupancy licenses for submission to the RTA (if necessary), and
 - c. all traffic control measures associated with street parties including all signage and other materials as well as labour on the day of the event.
2. vote \$4,500 to cover the costs associated with the street party applications, with funds being allocated from the 2009/10 Council Contingency Fund.
